If approved, the bond proceeds would be used to finance capital construction for expanded college facilities; retire existing college debt used to purchase the existing campus; and pay bond issuance costs, providing for the following:

- New college classrooms and labs to accommodate expected student enrollment growth.
- Four new science labs to enroll more students in classes required for agriculture, business, and health-care professions.
- Three computer technology labs.
- Specialized space for new college workforce training programs, such as health care. construction/building trades, veterinary technology, and agriculture science. Additional instructional programs to train workers for existing and new businesses moving to the community.
- Expanded college classes for local high school students.
- Partnership with Klamath County to locate a branch library on the college campus.

Passage of the bond would qualify KCC to receive \$7.7 million in state funds for the construction.

The bonds will not exceed \$12.4 million and will mature in ten years. The annual cost to property owners is estimated to be \$0.35 per \$1000 of assessed value.

District's Communications Center receives all 9-1-1 calls for the County and does all emergency services dispatch for all public safety entities that operate throughout the County (except Oregon State Folice). Right now, Klamath 9-1-1: Fields over 13,000 calls per dispatcher per year. The National Fire Protection Association recommends enough dispatchers to limit the number of calls per dispatcher per year to 5000-7000. Is housed in a building that does not meet state codes for emergency facilities, meaning 9-1-1 service ie at risk during earthquakes, floods, and heavy snows. Has a radio system that's incompatible with industry standard that other agencies are adopting. If the bonds are approved, they will be payable from taxes on property or property ownership that are not subject to the limits of Sections 11 and 11b, Article XI of the Oregon Constitution.

SUMMARY 175 words

This measure authorizes the City of Klamath Falls to issue general obligation bonds in an amount not exceeding \$4,000,000 for a new Police Station. If approved, the bonds would provide funds to finance a portion of the costs of capital construction and capital improvements associated with the remodeling of the former Shasta Way armory into a new station for the Klamath Falls Police Department. These costs would include, but not be limited to, the following:

- Remodel, construct, furnish and equip the new City Police Station
- Acquire personal property for the station
- Pay bond issuance costs

The bonds will mature with annual principal payments to be paid over a period of 31 years or less. The remaining \$2.5 million in cost would be financed and paid from other general fund City resources.
