

1. The purpose of this grant was to map the local navigable water trails with the objective to produce a tri-fold map of our local to the Chiloquin area water trails with also featuring local businesses and interpretive landmarks. Please reference the attached brochure as the final product of this grant.
2. Details of the matching funds are found on the attached budget sheet which documents the projected and actual costs as well. Copies of all invoices verifying the expenditures to map the water trails and produce the brochure are also attached.
3. The marketing plan included tapping into the local knowledge base including the Klamath Tribes and insuring a collaborative effort throughout the duration of this project. A GIS specialist and former employee of Crater Lake National park was consulted on the specifics of interpretation of GIS mapping data both historical and current. Input was elicited from members of the Klamath Tribes as well as generational members of the greater Chiloquin community, especially regarding the historic as well as current use of our local waterways and what activities take place seasonally within our geographic area.
4. I am pleased to report that almost all of our marketing dollars were spent on local advice, mapping, and the actual design of the brochure. Please see the Expense Itemization Table dated 12/4/2020. and attached copies of the invoices.
5. The most successful was the production of the actual brochure featuring local businesses and the water trails map. Also working in collaboration with the Klamath tribes resulted in a consensus on the importance of preserving the historic use and land integrity of our local waterways. Unfortunately, the least successful part of this project and a tragedy for our area was the 242 Fire in September 2020, as this large wildland fire burned over much of the riparian ecosystem that was featured in our lovely brochure including Spring Creek.

*The sustainability of Oregon's waterways depends on dedicated stewardship by all users.*

### PLAN & PREPARE:

- To help protect our shorelines for healthy streamside vegetation and a thriving waterway ecosystem, only use established and designated launch zones.
- Park in designated parking areas and carry your equipment to launch site.
- Do not try to launch or exit beyond the established ramp zone.
- Inspect your watercraft before entering or leaving the waterway, make sure it is clean of any vegetation or debris, drain any standing water, and ensure that it is dry before it enters a new waterway. Inspections help prevent invasive species.

### KEEP OUR WATERS CLEAN & CLEAR:

Our waters are home to rare invertebrate species, and their unpolluted habitat is crucial to a diverse and thriving Klamath Basin waterway ecosystem. Help keep waterways clear of any litter, human waste, aquatic invasive species, and personal hygiene products – what you carry in, you must carry out!

### BE CONSIDERATE:

- Most routes flow through or next to private land. Remain on designated water trails and only use established public access areas. Never park, launch, or land on private property without permission.
- Be aware of other users like streambank anglers and boaters.
- Our waterways have deep cultural and historic significance to the local community. Please be respectful as we share these resources with each other.

Remember to come prepared, completely clean and dry out your watercraft, and bring a desire to explore these amazing routes in the Klamath Basin. Make sure to take only photographs as souvenirs and share your experience with others!

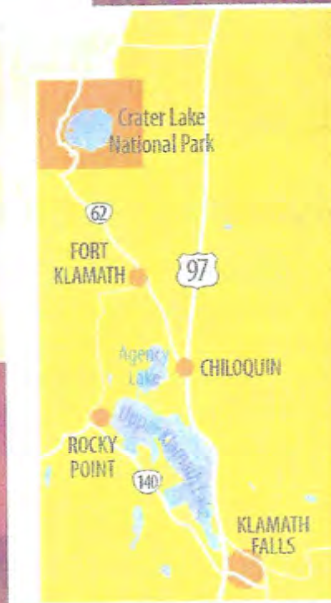
### SAFETY:

- A whistle is required on board the watercraft, as is a Personal Flotation Device for each person.
- Children 12 years and younger must wear a PFD at all times.
- Always carry a snack, flashlight, sunscreen, drinking water and protective clothing with you.
- You must have a Waterway Access Permit for watercrafts 10 ft and longer. Visit [MYODFW.com](http://MYODFW.com) for information.
- Morning is best for easier paddling, as winds pick up in the afternoon.
- Water levels vary seasonally. Check local conditions before you embark on your adventure.

### Upper Klamath Canoe Trail

Malone Springs to Rocky Point Boat Launch | 9.5 miles | 3-4.5 hour

This signed trail is a relaxed paddle, winding through 15,000 acres of marsh channel lined with tules, wocus and towering mountain views. In spring it's a symphony of bird songs. There is a slight current, but it can be paddled either direction. Malone Springs offers a pit toilet, while Rocky Point Boat Launch has restrooms and accessible boat and fishing docks. ### Williamson River

Collier State Park to Sportsman's River Retreat | 12 miles | 4-6 hours

The longest of the 3 water trails, it flows through pine forests with willow-covered shorelines, with abundant wildlife viewing. The 12 mile, 4-6 hr route begins at Collier State Park Day Use Area, on the East side of Hwy 97, with the option to divide the trip into smaller segments, stopping at Chiloquin Bridge, Waterwheel RV Park & Campground (launch fee), and on to Sportsman's River Retreat (launch fee). Collier State Park is not equipped with a permanent boat launch, so use caution when putting in your watercraft.

### Agency Lake & Wood River

Petric Park to Henzel Park | 5 miles | 2-3 hours

This route is a quicker float alongside rural pasture land with sweeping mountain views of Mt. McLoughlin and the rim of Crater Lake National Park. Keep your eye out for bald eagles, ospreys, American white pelicans, and great egrets that grace the sky, while river otters, beavers, and foxes roam below. From Petric Park, it's a calm 3/4 mile paddle to the first docking point at Wood River Wetlands, with 2 more miles along the lake front to Agency Lake Resort (launch fee) or 4 miles to Henzel Park boat launch.
